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What is harassment?

A person subjects another to harassment where they engage, intentionally or otherwise, in unwanted and unwarranted conduct which has the purpose or effect of.

- violating another person's dignity, or L
- creating an intimidating hostile, degrading, humiliating or offensive envi-II ronment for another person.

Harassment may involve repeated behaviour, but a one-off incident can also amount to harassment. The recipient does not need to have explicitly stated that the behaviour was unwanted

Social and online harassment

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- offensive comments or body language, including insults, jokes or gestures T and malicious rumours, open hostility, verbal or physical threats: these include all forms of harassment and abuse on the grounds of disability, race or sexual orientation
- insulting, abusive, embarrassing or patronising behaviour or comments II.
- III. humiliating, intimidating, and/or demeaning criticism
